The Harborage

Hometown Healer Dr. Edward R. "Uncle Ed" Perkins

The town doctor holds a key role in a rural area. Dr. Edward R. Perkins served in that role very well and contributed to Excelsior so much more.

Dr. Perkins was not only a physician, but also a patriot, politician, community activist, and entrepreneur. Born July 31, 1842 in Albion, New York, he moved with his parents to Minneapolis in 1854. He enlisted in Company D, Second Minnesota Volunteer Infantry, June 27, 1861, and received a disability discharge October 16, 1862 with the rank of corporal, having taken part in numerous engagements. He married Julia Chase, of Minneapolis, on February 25, 1864. In 1869, he followed his father, Thomas H. Perkins, to Minnetonka Mills where his father built a flour mill. He helped with the management of the facility until it was sold in 1871 to Hedderly & Vroman. This was also when he began to engage in politics, becoming a perennial Republican convention delegate and activist for the remainder of this life. In the mid-1870's, he dabbled in the Grange movement, an influential American agricultural advocacy group, of which he was later nominated for the Master of the State Grange in 1874. Though active on a state level, he only held office locally, being elected to Minnetonka Justice of the Peace in 1876, Excelsior Village Council in 1886, Excelsior Village Council President in 1887, and numerous years on the Excelsior Board of Health.

Lake Minnetonka Historical Organizations Study Update

The ELMHS continues its partnership with Deephaven Historical Society, Minnetonka Historical Society, The Museum of Lake Minnetonka, Wayzata Historical Society, and Westonka Historical Society to explore ways that our organizations can better collaborate to serve the history of the Lake Minnetonka area, now and in the future.

Our consultant for this project, Arts Consulting Group, has now completed a benchmarking study of three other US historical organizations; interviews with twenty stakeholders; two virtual "town hall meetings" with twenty-six individuals and a comprehensive survey of 588 people. Next steps include the development of two operational models for further exploration and a public report on the findings of the study.

The Society was heartened and inspired by the outpouring of interest and enthusiasm for the history of our area and the support for this project. We are deeply grateful to everyone who has participated in the interviews, town halls and surveys and look forward to sharing what we have learned later in the year.

Perkins turned his attention to medicine in 1873 when he began, at age 31, his instruction with Dr. William H. Leonard of Minneapolis. The following year, he entered Hahnemann Medical College in Philadelphia. He graduated in the spring of 1878, and settled in Excelsior. The *Tourist & Sportsman*, June 8, 1878, announced his arrival in Excelsior. "Among the valuable accessions to the population of Excelsior, is that of Dr. E. R. Perkins, whose card will be found in another column. As so many invalids make a home at this resort during the summer, it may be a matter of interest to them to know that good medical advice may be procured at any moment, without the delay and expense of sending to the city."


Despite being busy with house calls, he entered several organizations including the Ancient Order of Foresters of America, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and the Grand Army of the Republic. He also became involved with and led the charge of several civic organizations including: Minneapolis Academy, Excelsior Improvement Association, Excelsior Improvement League, Excelsior Civic League, and Excelsior Magazine Club.

Among his business ventures was the Excelsior Electric and Water Company. The Excelsior Electric and Water Company was incorporated March 14, 1888 by Edward R. Perkins, Alanson W. Latham, Freeman G. Gould, Adrian E. Apgar, Edward P. Beeman, and Robert B. McGrath. Their dream was to create an electric plant and water works for the village of Excelsior. It would take nearly two decades for this dream to become a reality.

Dr. Perkins' most successful commercial adventure was the Excelsior Chemical Company. The product was Excelsior Antiseptic Dressing produced at the "mud factory" in Excelsior. The compound was commonly known as *Excelsine*. Dr. Perkins spent months developing a recipe for his antiseptic mud, using clays and ores from Lake Superior, Colorado, California, Virginia, Missouri and the old brick yard on the Bardwell place in Excelsior.

Starting in the fall of 1892, Dr. Perkins had his mud factory constructed where the west municipal parking lot is today. It was two stories tall and

20x60 feet. The factory included a mill for crushing the ores and mixing them all together, worktables and drying racks. As a young man, Stuart Dimond worked at the factory. He recalled Richard Perkins, a grandson of Dr. Perkins, recruiting boys and men to work at the factory when there was a batch of mud ready for packaging. They worked at a long table with a big kettle in the middle. Putty knives were used to fill square tins that were then slid down to the foreman to be weighed in at 8 ounces.

These were next capped and labeled before being shipped across the country. The price was \$1.00 for a one pound can or \$5.00 for six cans.

Directions on the label were as follows: "Cover the inflamed parts with the Dressing from one-eighth to one-fourth of an inch thick, put on with a case knife or spatula. Then cover the Dressing with two layers

of cotton—surgeon's preferred, but the common will do. Then bandage over all in the usual way. . ."

Excelsine was also prescribed as a chest treatment for pneumonia, pleurisy and puerperal peritonitis. It seemed to be most effective as a topical treatment on wounds and skin conditions such as cuts, abrasions, burns, carbuncles, rashes, and poison ivy reactions.

Following the devastating fire at Hinckley, Minnesota on September 3, 1894, Dr. Perkins took a large stock of his Excelsior Antiseptic Dressing and personally treated many burn victims. Upon his return to Excelsior, Dr. Perkins headed a relief effort that raised nearly \$100 to ease the suffering of those affected by the vast forest fire that destroyed the entire town of Hinckley.

Dr. Edward Rowlandson Perkins died May 21, 1910. During the previous year, he had told friends that his death was imminent. That morning he was on a streetcar waiting for it to depart so he could attend to a patient in Hopkins. He was suddenly stricken though, by a suspected cerebral hemorrhage. "Uncle Ed" had cared for the injured and ill of Excelsior for 32 years. The entire village of Excelsior shut down for his funeral. It was held at the Perkins home and the crowd filled the entire house, lawn and the adjoining street. He was laid to rest at Lakewood Cemetery in Minneapolis next to his parents and grandparents.
